These recordings will be stored in archival format that will be preserved for future generations and can be used for documentary presentations.

STATE REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES

AMHA recently began the process of applying for listing on the State Register of Historic Places. Four board members, Dawson Grau, and Norm Moshier met with Travis Bowman on October 21 at the Heritage Farm with a walk-through of the buildings and grounds. Bowman explained, "The purpose of the legislation which created the National Register of Historic Places was to *protect* historic properties from government actions rather than a method of imposing state control." Dawson Grau will do the paperwork and submit it to the State Board for review and their decision to be made in March. Being on the register does not change our goals, vision, and plans for the Heritage Farm.

ELECTRONIC CATALOGING

Through the Northern New York Community Foundation, AMHA was awarded a grant of \$20,000 in 2008. A large majority of the monies was spent toward shelving units for the archival collections and the remaining on a desktop computer, printer/scanner, and *PastPerfect Museum* software which is housed in the new basement of the heritage homestead. The software program is a widely used collection-management program with thousands of organizations using it worldwide. The *PastPerfect* software will be used to catalog the following AMHA collections into the computer:

- 1. Objects
- 2. Photographs
- 3. Archives (document collections, manuscripts, oral histories, maps, music collections, and personal papers)
- 4. Library (books, pamphlets, and magazines)

This electronic cataloging is at the beginning stage and will continue to be a long-range project as collections continue to be donated to AMHA with much appreciation.

1 Cup Brown Sugar
1/2 Cup Lard
3/4 Cup Sour Milk
1 Cup Raisins
1 Orange
1 Teaspoon soda
1/2 Teaspoon salt
2 Cups flour
Chopped walnuts

Charlotte Clifton's MAPLE COTTAGE PUDDING

Heat 1 Cup maple syrup to boiling. Put into a regular size bread tin.

Make a batter of:

2 Tablespoons shortening

3 Tablespoons sugar

1 Egg

1/2 Cup milk 1/4 Teaspoon salt

1 Cup flour

2 Teaspoon Baking Powder

Pour batter on top of syrup. Bake in moderate oven 30 minutes.

Turn upside down on plate.

Sprinkle with chopped nuts.

Serve with whipped cream.
